PROTOCOLS FOR WORSHIP AND OTHER INDOOR GATHERINGS AT KING OF KINGS REVISED AS OF July 29, 2023

These protocols are subject to change at any time based on information received from Bishop Egensteiner, the Orange County Health Department, the Governor of New York, and the CDC.

Wearing of masks inside the church is optional. Anyone who chooses to wear a mask may do so without judgment. Masks and hand sanitizer are available from the Greeter.

Write or highlight your name (recorded for service attendance) at the lectern in the entryway.

Take a bulletin. You may place an offering in the offering plate in the entry area.

All pews are open for sitting.

The service is livestreamed and begins when the organist / pianist starts the prelude; please cease conversing and listen silently to prepare yourself for worship (your conversation may be heard on the livestream).

Worshippers are welcome to speak responses and sing hymns and liturgical music.

When sharing the peace, offer a smile or a hand signal, but do not touch.

PROTOCOL FOR COMMUNION: When the pastor invites you, EITHER --

- 1. Remain in the pew and tell the usher you want to commune in your pew; the pastor and the assistant will bring you the elements. Place the empty cup or container in the pew receptacle. OR --
- 2. Come forward via the middle aisle at the direction of the usher, move to the right or the left of the altar rail, kneel or stand, and receive a wafer from the pastor; if you prefer a gluten-free wafer or pre-packaged elements, please tell the pastor. Take a cup of red wine or white grape juice from the tray held by the communion assistant. Return to your pew by the side aisles, and dispose of the empty cup or container in the receptacle at the side of the chancel or in the pew.

Please refrain from talking during the postlude so it is not heard on the livestream. Please have your post-worship discussions outside the Sanctuary.

Introduction

The image of the good shepherd shows us how the risen Christ brings us to life. It is the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep, one of mutual knowledge and love, that gives the shepherd authority. The shepherd's willingness to lay down his life for the sheep shows his love. We show our love for each other by sharing our time, caring and wealth with any sibling in need.

HOLY GOSPEL: John 10:7a, 10b, 11-18

In language that recalls the twenty-third psalm, Jesus describes himself as the shepherd who cares for his sheep. He is willing to die for them, and he is able to overcome death for them.

- P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 10th chapter.
- C Glory to you, O Lord.

(N: Narrator; J1-4: Jesus)

- N Jesus said to them.
- I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.
- J2 The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep.
- I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd.
- J4 For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.

ALWAYS ROOM FOR ONE MORE

When Jesus says "I am" in the Gospel of John, he unlocks a new perspective on his love. In today's reading, when Jesus declares, "I am the good shepherd," we can imagine our Lord caring for us and guiding us. We picture ourselves as his sheep. It's reassuring to hear that we aren't alone to navigate the dangers and challenges of this world. We have a loving shepherd who is looking out for us.

Jesus loves us so much that he goes above and beyond the shepherd's role as a caretaker. He gives up his own life so our sins can be forgiven and we can receive eternal life. That's what being a good shepherd means—having such a close relationship with the sheep that the shepherd will stop at nothing to protect them. The shepherd will lay down his own life so his sheep can have life.

When we hear Jesus' promise to be our good shepherd, we must not miss his commitment to gather up the sheep that aren't yet part of his flock. They, too, will listen to Jesus' voice. Responding to his loving call, they will become part of the one flock that follows Jesus as their good shepherd, their Savior, and their Lord. No matter how many sheep are already jostling for space, there is always room for one more. Just like there is always room at our holy communion table for one more person to eat the bread, drink the wine, and receive the gifts of God's mercy and grace. We can always squeeze closer to the sheep around us to let one or more sheep enter Jesus' flock, thankful that the flock is growing and that we get to listen to the loving voice of our good shepherd, together.


LIFE LAID DOWN

How does faith in the risen Christ call one to live? What shape does one's life take? Five times in eight short verses Jesus mentions laying down his life for the sake of the sheep.

A friend tells the story of her grandfather, a faithful man who earned a modest income. Each year when tax time rolled around, he was audited. According to tax records he earned so little and gave away so much. The astounded auditors questioned him, wondering why he gave so much of his income to the church. Incredulous, he responded, "You can't outgive God."

The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep, and joined to the risen life of Christ, the lives of the baptized are shaped by generosity and sacrifice. Giving one's life, resources, whatever one holds most dear for the sake of another is witness to the love we have first been shown and an act of faith. Hearing Jesus' words in this Easter season reminds us that laying down one's life is not an act to be feared; rather, it is an act that defies death, as we trust that, washed in the waters of baptism, we already live in the resurrected life of Christ.








Sharing of Tithes and Offerings

- 1. Remain in the pew and tell the usher you want to commune in your pew; the pastor and the assistant will bring you the elements. Place the empty cup or container in the pew receptacle. OR --
- 2. Come forward via the middle aisle at the direction of the usher, move to the right or the left of the altar rail, kneel or stand, and receive a wafer from the pastor; if you prefer a gluten-free wafer or pre-packaged elements, please tell the pastor. Children who are not prepared for communion or any who do not want to receive the elements may come forward for a blessing. Take a cup of red wine or white grape juice from the tray held by the communion assistant. Return to your pew by the side aisles, and dispose of the empty cup or container in the receptacle at the side of the chancel or in the pew.

Please be assured that no matter your preferences, Jesus comes to you in this meal.

POSTLUDE





[Describing a vision she had while in prison and awaiting martyrdom in 213:] I saw a brazen ladder of wondrous length reaching up to heaven, and on the sides of the ladder were fastened all kinds of iron weapons. Just beneath the ladder was a dragon couching of wondrous size who lay in wait and sought to frighten those from going up. And I said, "In the name of Jesus Christ, the dragon will not hurt me." And the dragon put out his head gently, as if afraid of me, just at the foot of the ladder; and as though I were treading on the first step, I trod on his head. And I went up the ladder, and I saw a vast expanse of garden, and in the midst a man sitting with white hair, in the dress of a shepherd, a tall man, milking sheep; and round about were many thousands clad in white. And he looked at me and said, "You have well come, my child." And he gave me a morsel of the milk which he was milking, and I received it in my joined hands, and ate, and all they that stood around said, "Amen." And at the sound of the word I woke, still eating something sweet.

ABUNDANT CARE

One of the things that drew people to Jesus was that he was a master communicator. Drawing from examples of daily life, like shepherding, fishing, and growing grapes, he helped people see the connections between their story and God's story. He drew from very ordinary and familiar elements like bread, water, and light to describe how God is at work in our lives and the world.

If Jesus were using imagery from our world today, it's interesting to ponder what illustrations he might use to remind us of God's presence and grace. However, even though much has changed from the ancient world, the "I am" sayings of Jesus, like those found in today's gospel, are still amazingly relevant and tell us a great deal about how God moves among us.

When Jesus says, "I am the good shepherd" (John 10:11), and describes how this shepherd cares for his sheep, he is naming God's abundant care for each and every one of us. Perhaps you don't always feel the immediacy of God's care. There are moments in each of our lives when our outlook is bleak, when God's provision doesn't seem obvious, and when we wonder where God is in the midst of a trying situation.

But as the good shepherd, Jesus does not wait for us to be able to name our needs and pain before he comes to heal it. Jesus knows each one of his sheep in all their particular uniqueness: "I know my own" (John 10:14). God the good shepherd anticipates our needs and gives generously so we may have life in Jesus' name. This is a promise we can depend on yesterday, today, and tomorrow.
